Higher Education Minister Datuk Seri Dr Zambry Abdul Kadir yesterday said the decision for both ministries to <u>work together</u> was made following a discussion with Health Minister Datuk Seri Dr Dzulkefly Ahmad, as well as representatives from both ministries, the Malaysian Medical Council (MMC), and the Malaysian Qualifications Agency (MQA).

"The Higher Education Ministry and the Health Ministry have a common intention and desire to promptly find a solution to the issue. Insya-Allah, the final decision on this matter will be shared after several proposals are brought to the Cabinet meeting," he said in a Facebook posting.
